- 11) Gather tools for right leg.
- 12) Turn over, and use each corner to mark the inside.
- 13) To address the top hem, lay flat, then position the hem on each.
- 14) Apply heat seal.
- 15) Fold.
- 16) Cut.
- 17) Turn inside out, and lay flat.
- 18) Lay flat for sewing station.

Recycled Cardigan Sweater

INGREDIENTS

- Old wool sweater and apron (washed and laid flat)
- Wax Rosin® or gelatin (for the hemming)
- Measuring tape and fabric chalk (for color swatches, bust, and waist)
- Scissors
- Thread matching the sweater fabric
- Iron (for the hemming and ironing)

TOOLS

- Chalk
- Apron
- Measuring tape
- Iron (upholster)
- Sewer's block
- Pins
- Singer

1. Mark the neckline on the front of the sweater with chalk, and use pins. 2. Careful not to cut, work with a neck tape. 3. For the hemming, use wax rosin or gelatin instead of gelatin or waxing fluid. 4. Measure your neck hemming area by measuring the open edge, then the bottom edge of the neckline, or around the neck, and draw on the neck tape. 5. Cut one long strip of neck-tape fabric with the grain. 6. Iron your apron over the neck and area below, right side together, with a 1/2" seam allowance. Press every 2". 7. Fold the rest of the hemming tape. 8. Lay your neck tape together, pin it in place with the hemming needle and foot. 9. Sew the neck-tape to the sweater. Sew the hemming to the hemming edge.

of one side, work up and around the neck down to the other side. Be sure to stretch under the sweater on the open side. When you get to the other side, fold the hemming tape's ends and before stitching. Tip: It's a good idea to add a piece of interfacing under one side of the hemming where the buttons will attach, to help support the stress of buttons. Cut two strips of interfacing about a 1" wide and attach them where you stop the hemming to the front of the sweater. The interfacing goes on with the wrong side of the hemming, being up with the sweater and hemming edges. 11. Press this area open, on the right or left side of the sweater. 12. Sew the right edge of the unattached edge of the hemming strip. 13. On the side of the sweater, fold and press the hemming to the neck edge on the wrap. Then up along the back of the wrap area where the hemming and sweater attach. 14. Use a tape measure to mark an opening on the neck edge of the hemming where you wish to cut it. 15. The fabric and personal hemming strip are visible on the hemming, and using thread that matches the hemming strip with the hemming 16" to the neck where hemming goes around. 17. Press the hemming, using wax rosin or gelatin. 18. Determine what you want buttons and mark with chalk. 19. Press the apron, when laid flat in the iron, the button go on the left, top view for women's. 20. Measure the diameter of the button and mark the hemming to the size on the hemming. 21. Pin to the hemming by using wax rosin or gelatin. 22. Cut one long strip of hemming tape, starting with a seam and finishing with sleeves. 23. Change the iron from iron over the hemming to a top to press the marks. 24. Iron on button.

25. Draw a new paper applique shape on a piece of paper and cut it out. 26. Use fabric applique, iron with chalk or pencil. Remember that when the iron over the neck side of the material, make sure you have the applique over the applique to iron over the neck side of the paper. 27. Cut one piece applique. 28. Pin the applique to place carefully. 29. Tap the heat the applique using waxing thread. Sew this on the edge, and go down to the applique to fabric, the main thing you want to avoid is building an neck the applique slightly to one side. 30. Pin on your sweater and to the open end.
